



Supreme Court Hits Unprecedented Records With 90 Judgments

The Supreme Court of Liberia has set a record with 90 judgments in a single term as it concludes the March term of court for 2026 under the leadership of Chief Justice, His Honor Yamie Quiqui Gbeisay Sr., who praised his erudite colleagues during the closure of the March Term of court. The Honorable Supreme Court of Liberia has concluded its March Term A.D. 2026 with ninety cases; thirty-four (34) were advance opinions delivered at the beginning of the Term, while fifty-six (56) were regular opinions handed down at its closure.

The docket included high-profile criminal cases involving past and present government officials, as well as matters ranging from murder to ejectment actions and debt disputes. Some of these appeals had been pending before the Court for more than eleven years. Speaking at the close of the Term on Friday, August 28, 2026, Chief Justice His Honor Yamie Quiqui Gbeisay, Sr. praised the full Bench for delivering the highest number of opinions in recent judicial history.

“Today, I can safely say that with this huge number of cases adjudicated for this Term of Court, the Supreme Court full bench has made significant progress in rendering justice to the citizens and residents of Liberia. When you lawyers were sleeping, we the justices of this court were working. This, for me, is worth commendation,” Chief Justice Gbeisay stated.

He emphasized that appeals are a matter of right, and once filed, the Supreme Court has no choice but to hear them. “This means that while others were resting, Justices of the Supreme Court worked overnight without sleeping just to ensure that justice is served to citizens and residents within Liberia,” he noted.

Chief Justice Gbeisay instructed the Clerk of the Supreme Court to formally notify President Joseph Nyuma Boakai, Speaker of the House of Representatives Hon. Richard Nagbe Koon, and President Pro-Tempore of the Liberian Senate Hon. Nyonblee Karnga-Lawrence that the Court has adjourned its March 2026 Term.
